They develop memory skills, build vocabulary, learn new skills and knowledge and learn how to get on with adults and other children. We have had lots of fun playing and learning together.

At Woodstock school we are lucky enough to have a school pool which means many of our children were able to join their mainstream class for swimming. Thanks to the fantastic weather, some days it was hard to get them out of the water!

Play times have been another highlight of our term. The school had a new junior playground put in at the end of last year and it has proved to be very popular. It is a great way for us to interact with friends from around the school, building up strength, balance and coordination at the same time.

Conductive Education (Southern) Charitable Trust

We are now providing experiences of a letter a fortnight. The whole class programme is based on the letter that we are experiencing. One fortnight this term we experienced the letter T. In another photo, two of the ākonga are playing with the bubbles, for the letter B while others in the background are finishing a group writing experience of that letter using white boards.

Pauline is very skilled at using Coreboard and also, of course, is Janet



the SLT. As the boards are now being used regularly by staff, the children are now all looking at the visuals on the boards and some are beginning to find the visuals they need to communicate. In another of the photos Daemon is working with some transport visuals and the Coreboard has been used to consolidate the communication with him about the task that he is doing.

There have been many lovely days outside in the beautiful weather that we have had. One of our goals for this year is to try to get some funding to provide suitable matting and equipment for our outside area as well as equipment for our sensory room. This may be a very long-term goal :) but we are in the process of applying for funding and meeting with people who may help. It will be so wonderful once we have an attractive outside area available for the ākonga.

The other specialists we have working alongside our young people include a Music Therapist, Speech Language Therapist, and Physiotherapist.

Neuro Connection Foundation

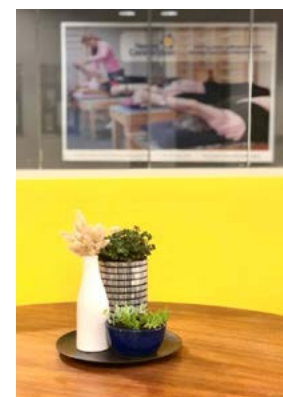

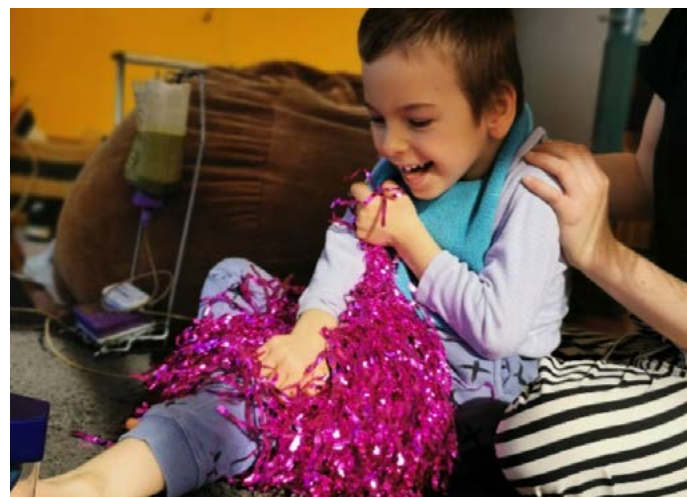

the 19th March for the afternoon to help us with a working bee. A huge thanks to the wonderful Kate who organised everything from their end.
