Over the winter months we have been trying to keep active while raising awareness and fundraising to build our second accessible home that will support disabled people to learn the skills needed to embrace independent living. This project has been a priority for our Governance Committee in making Conductive Education Canterbury sustainable into the future through the rental income from the house. In August we set people the challenge of taking part in our "Wheelie Awesome Wheel-a-thon" and were really encouraged to see so many involved. We were supported by past and present whanau including babies, children, and adults, our local community including children from Addington Te Kura Taumatua and CEC staff members. It was so inspiring to see the challenges that past children were setting themselves, such as Vicky who first started at CEC when she was 1 year old, who is now 17 years old and an Ambassador for CEC, using her exercycle for 15 minutes each day. Montana who started at 9 months old, and is now 19 and a valued member of the staff working as an Education Support Worker, pledging to wheel 100km on her bike. Final figures still come in but inital indications are we raised just over \$9,000 collectively.

NZFCE Life Member and former Patron, Wayne Smith was keen to bring along some of the wāhine from the team to take part in our Wheel-a-thon at CEC. We were so honoured to build this new connection and relationship with the Black Ferns and look forward to supporting the wāhine toa at Rugby World Cup this October and November in Aotearoa.

August was a busy month for us as we were also blessed to be the recipients of the Placemakers Community working bee after their National Conference.

We're delighted to announced that our Early Intervention teacher, Jess, has just welcomed a wee one into the world. While she's busy taking care of him, with exuberant assistance from his older sister, we're so lucky to have Rebecca (Becks) Paris covering her role. Thankfully, Becks also has a high tolerance for nonsense and brings her own vibrant flavour to our dynamic little team.



Legends went Wilder

Our annual fundraiser, Legends go WildER for Conductive Education, finally went ahead (after three date changes!) in September, and by all accounts was a roaring success. Thanks to the incredible generosity of our community, we raised \$41,000 for our centre. Elizabeth Millen was the undisputed star of the show, delivering a stunning opening address that had the crowd of 200 on their feet for a standing ovation. She gave this evocative and enlightening description of cerebral palsy; "Cerebral palsy is a motor disorder that causes the electrical signals in my brain to skip some of the circuits in my cerebrum, so they don't get through to the muscles properly. Can you imagine your phone running out of Wi-Fi when you're just about to finish a text? That's what it's like with my nerves, or nerve signals more specifically. 'The signal to the quadriceps failed to send'."

Celebrating our own legend

Craig Nielsen was presented with a Citizens Award in July, in recognition of his contribution to our community. We're all so proud of what he's achieved, and to be part



of a community that acknowledges the significance of Conductive Education. However, we suggest you also refuse the offer to refer to him as Lord Nielsen.

New developments

Thanks to a generous two-year commitment by our major funder, the TOI Foundation, we have launched a new programme, *Kaitiaki ō to Manawa Ora*, delivered by our Whānau Liaison, Pip Kay. The aim is to facilitate resilience and capability-building for whānau whaikaha building authentic knowledge, empowering and enabling parents to successfully advocate for their children, to share and receive emotional support.

Pip's brainchild, "Empower Me", an online connector for the web of health, education and disability service providers, was one of six finalists in Innovate Taranaki. We are now getting ready to pitch this to investors.

We have also expanded our Conductor-led neurological rehabilitation for youth (*Resilient Rangatahi*) and have employed a social worker to facilitate an inclusive playgroup, set up as a safe space for mums at risk of dropping out of antenatal groups when their kids don't meet conventional milestones, and providing emotional support.

In April, we lost our dearly beloved Suzanne Fraser. She's been a part of our little crew since the early days, and we all miss her. Her family have established a Conductive Education Taranaki scholarship in her name, as we were a cause close to her heart. This is a huge honour for us, and it helps us to remember her with the same love, hope and gratitude she lived by.



Addington Te Kura Taumatua

It has certainly been a strange year so far, but that does seem to be the new normal in recent times!

Terms 2 and 3 for us were greatly affected by illness, both for staff and students. Our families worked incredibly hard to keep their children safe from Covid, but still a number were affected, as well as most of our staff. A number of other illnesses also hit around the same time. This led to a very disrupted time, as we had minimal days with our full complement of staff, which made it challenging to run our usual programmes as we would like.

I feel very proud of our children, whānau, and staff, for how hard they have worked to keep everything going and keep the children as safe as possible.

We had a very wet winter, which meant a lot of time inside. We are fortunate to have such a lovely environment to work in, and there was always plenty of fun to be had.

It is so important for all our students to experience a range of sensory learning experiences. Our staff have been very clever in finding ways to present learning and play with a sensory focus. The children have many opportunities each day to explore touch and texture in different ways, experience visual stimulation, different sounds, smells and sometimes taste as well. Water





is always a big favourite, along with messy play and trying out different textures. It's such a wonderful way to practise our communication of likes and dislikes, try something new, and ask for 'more', 'different', or to say 'finished'. Thank you to all our staff for your endless creativity.

As I write we are enjoying all the signs of spring, and this is giving us more time outside to get lots of fresh air and see what is happening around the school.

We recently enjoyed a trip to the Canterbury Museum to see the dinosaurs, and look forward to a lovely time meeting the animals at Willowbank in Term 4 as an end of year treat.

Every Tuesday we look at 'The World around Us' focusing on our local environment and some current events such as Matariki and the Queen's memorial celebrations.

Our roll continues to expand to the extent where we will be at maximum capacity in our physical space by the end of this year. We currently have 18 tamariki engaged with Conductive Education at our kura. 13 students are fulltime in our Conductive classroom and 5 students attend our mainstream classes while having access to our sensory and physical therapy programmes.

Despite numerous setbacks in health across the year our students continue to meet challenges with tenacity. Highlights have been the gains made in communication for
