Kia ora koutou

Term 3 has been a vibrant and busy one for our tamariki and team as we dove deep into the schoolwide theme of "Oceans", with a big build-up to our whole school production of Disney's *Finding Nemo Jr*, which was performed this term to much excitement and applause!

As part of the production, our unit joined forces with the junior school to become part of a colourful coral reef ensemble at the front of the stage. In preparation, we had a blast tie-dyeing our own t-shirts to wear as part of our costumes – a fun, creative activity that gave each student the chance to contribute to the show in their own unique way. They also got to wear caps that were decorated as coral reefs too.

Our learning has been filled with discovery, imagination, and hands-on exploration. In sensory sessions, we've engaged with all things under the sea – from sharks and fish to jellyfish, seaweed, waves, and of course, everything about *Finding Nemo*. These sessions have been rich in language, movement, and sensory experiences, helping our students make real-world connections in fun and meaningful ways.



In science, we've been diving into non-fiction, learning fascinating facts about a wide range of ocean creatures – including sharks, octopuses, penguins, jellyfish, starfish, sea turtles, and coral. We've also carried out lots of hands-on experiments to help us understand the special features and adaptations these animals use to survive in their environments – from blubber insulation, different types of shark teeth, and how jellyfish move, to octopuses squirting ink and starfish regrowing their legs. These interactive sessions have sparked so much curiosity and wonder in our learners.


Each week, we've also "travelled" the globe through our weekly country study, where we learn a little about a different country – and then try our hand at cooking a recipe from that place. These sessions have offered exciting new tastes, smells, and cultural connections, and have become a real highlight of our week.

Of course, we also participated in Wheelee Awesome Month again this term – a much-loved part of our calendar. We were thrilled to meet our goal for wheeling kilometres 80kms each, and our students showed determination, joy, and teamwork throughout. While we've reached our movement target, our fundraising efforts are ongoing, and we're so grateful to everyone in the community who continues to support our learners and programmes.

As always, our team continues to weave the principles of Conductive Education through every aspect of our learning, ensuring that every activity supports communication, movement, independence, and confidence. It's been a joy to watch our students thrive in such a dynamic and engaging environment.

We're incredibly proud of the mahi our learners have done this term – and we're just as proud to be part of such a supportive and creative school community.

Conductive Education Taranaki – New Plymouth

Kia ora koutou, from the CE Taranaki team.

It has been a lively and rewarding few months here, with plenty happening both inside and outside the classroom. Our roll has remained strong, keeping our Conductors and therapists very busy each week.

This past term, we sparked curiosity and creativity in the classroom as we explored a variety of occupations. This topic offered wonderful opportunities for role play, practicing social interactions and learning about the people and places that make up our community. Some groups discovered the charm of traditional snail mail, while others took on the responsibility of buying milk for the office from the local dairy.

Whānau involvement continues to be a highlight, with many happy faces at our annual Wheelie Awesome Wheel-a-thon event, held mid-September. A wheelie awesome Sunday afternoon completing laps, bouncing on the bouncy castles, eating sausies and steak sammies, getting in to win the raffles, stocking up on delicious baking, and leaving looking a little different with a gorgeous face paint. Once again our community came together to support us and we are truly grateful.

Behind the scenes, our Board and staff have been progressing work on our Early Childhood Education initiative. It is an exciting project, and while there is still plenty of planning to do, we are feeling optimistic about what this could mean for families in Taranaki.

AAC for the Win!

This year has seen exciting progress and growth in our tamariki with their use of Augmentative and Alternative Communication (AAC) within the classroom and in their wider learning environments. Conductive Education Taranaki is all about multimodal communication and we actively use NZSL - New Zealand Sign Language - in our sessions alongside spoken language to support children's understanding and offer an additional or alternative means of expressing themselves. One way we do this is planning a Sign of the Week that reflects our termly theme and the focus for that week in the classroom. Term 3 saw us focussing on 'Occupations' and our chosen signs were verbs and describing words related to each occupation. A standout sign which the kids loved to use was 'loud' - such a useful word! Another way we use AAC is through modelling of device-based communication systems such as *TD Snap* and *Proloquo2Go* on our CET iPad; it's been exciting having our own device to incorporate in speech sessions and the classroom, and to take into the community to show kindergartens what AAC can look like for our tamariki. Our children who have their own devices also bring these to session, and they love to share how they're feeling or share news from the previous week during circle time at the start of each session. Last week, our Speech and Language Therapist, Cara, observed a beautiful multimodal circle time. It was a wonderful opportunity to reinforce that every way of sharing our thoughts—whether through speech, sign, a communication device, or a combination—is equally valid.

As always, we are proud of the resilience and enthusiasm of our tamariki and grateful to our whānau, staff, and community supporters who make our work possible.

We received funding from *The Lion Foundation* to purchase a vibration plate and we are so excited about how this is going to support the existing intervention for our tamariki.

Winter weather and bugs impacted the Wheelie Awesome events we had planned during August. However, our Silly Sock fundraiser is still on.
