We remain committed to advocating for equitable access to services and will continue to work constructively to ensure the voices of our community are heard.

Our tamariki have loved exploring our environment during science afternoons, learning what plants need to grow. We were lucky to receive some donated Little Garden kits—despite being a few years old, many seeds sprouted beautifully! It's been so exciting to check on them each day and watch them grow. We've also been caring for our school garden by weeding, composting, and planting our seedlings, as well as creating a small worm farm—such a fun way to see how food scraps can be reused. A highlight was our visit to the Addington Park Community Garden, where we explored through our senses and enjoyed being out in nature.

Some of our students have also been taking part in weekly Riding for the Disabled sessions, definitely a highlight of the week! Participating students attend RDA for four school terms, giving them plenty of time to practice and develop their skills. This also allows spaces to open up each year, so new students can enjoy the experience too. The sessions follow a familiar routine, helping build independence and confidence, from checking their horse to getting helmets on. Once riding, students enjoy a range of fun activities while developing balance, coordination, and communication skills. There are always smiles, laughter, and proud moments along the way.

We are so proud of all our tamariki for their enthusiasm, courage, and hard work! It has been a fantastic start to the year, and we look forward to the next 6 months.

We started the year with our annual camp, Club R&R, an opportunity for our Conductive children and their siblings to come together, build confidence, friendships and independence while having loads of fun trying new activities as well as old favourites.

We spent the first day at TOPEC–Taranaki Outdoor Pursuits and Education Centre–where the incredible staff adjusted everything to the needs of our children–this meant we saw flying wheelchairs and boat swings with the biggest smiles you ever did see from the children. Climbing walls, bush walks, ropes courses, we wish everyone could experience the vibe that was felt at TOPEC–electric smiles, clapping for our teammate’s successes, shouts of excitement and a few tears from adults watching the incredible achievements.

After two days at home base–Westown School–avoiding the rain with bottle boat building, bug hotel making, tinkering with creations, swimming (in the rain) and loads of other fun activities we headed out to Waitara for a special family day. Excitement levels were high as everyone got to take the train down the Waitara line and back! And then we got to jump, roll, swing, balance, bounce and hide in the parachute at Gymnastics Waitara – a wonderful day of making memories.

Our camp would not be possible without the generous donation from our Fairy Godmother, the Taranaki Foundation and all the staff and volunteers that come together for the joy of the children.

Another special highlight was our unforgettable Wish4Fish trip. We were extremely spoilt by an anonymous donor who funded a weekend getaway for 15 of our families to Mount Maunganui, to go on the amazing Wish4Fish boat. A fully accessible boat run by a charitable trust to help individuals with health and wellbeing limitations get out on the water and enjoy the freedom and pleasure of our ocean waters. Families could choose whether to go out fishing on the Saturday or for a harbour cruise on the Sunday, the weather was fantastic and everyone had an amazing time.

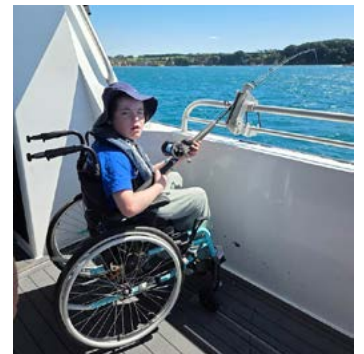
For many of our families, these experiences are about more than just the activity itself–they are about inclusion, possibility, and creating moments that might otherwise feel out of reach.

As we move into the colder months, we take time to reflect on the many challenges and opportunities our kaimahi and tamariki have faced. This moment of rest is especially welcomed, and we are grateful for the sense of stability that our collective hard work has delivered.

One of the most exciting adventures our tamariki have been on recently was a trip to Auckland Zoo back in March. We would like to sincerely thank Auckland Zoo for providing free entry to all our attendees through their *Wellbeing in Nature* programme—we are extremely grateful for their generosity. Our kaimahi love creating opportunities like this for our whānau, as they allow all groups within GlowKids to come together, share stories, and strengthen our sense of community. It's wonderful to see parents and caregivers supporting one another, connecting through shared experiences, and watching the tamariki explore their surroundings with such curiosity and excitement.

Another significant achievement for GlowKids is that MusicHelps has approved our grant application to fund two terms of Music Therapy, delivered by Raukatauri Music Therapy Centre. We are absolutely thrilled by this support and so excited to continue offering this valued service to our tamariki. Music Therapy is always a highlight of the week and provides a meaningful opportunity for both our Conductive Education Kindy and Sensory Kindy to come together.

We are also currently awaiting the outcome of our Early Intervention Contract application. Fingers and toes



are firmly crossed for good news! Our Centre Manager, Rhiannon Schroder, and Head Teacher, Luseane, have worked incredibly hard—putting in many extra hours to meet the deadline—and we are very grateful for the ongoing support provided by NZFCE throughout this process. Adding to this, Rhiannon has begun her first semester at Massey University, studying towards a Postgraduate Diploma in Specialist Teaching (Early Intervention), supported by a Ministry of Education Study Award. It has truly been a busy start to 2026.

All our tamariki are well settled and making positive strides in both their learning and personal independence. Our Sensory Kindy roll continues to grow steadily, and our Conductive Education Kindy students have been enjoying the addition of our visiting Conductor, Ildi, who joins the classroom on Thursdays. Ildi has returned to GlowKids in a mentor role to support our fulltime Conductor, Bianka, as she continues her professional growth and learning.

As our new Kaiako is also a trained music therapist, our regular music therapist is taking groups of students and children from across the rest of our Kura in the same group. This has proven to be a great way to have children from across the school working together in a different way.

Wana Tamariki has had a great 2026 so far. We had a number of our tamariki head to school and start their primary school journey. We miss them but the celebration that comes with their graduation from Wana Tamariki is wonderful and the next part of their journey is super exciting.
